Now we're starting to discover what the story means to the cast outside of the context of the plot line. The story of Tevye, a poor milkman, and his family has tugged at the heartstrings of audience members for years. Tevye's struggle to keep his balance between letting his daughters find love and keeping with an age old tradition is such a beautiful picture. The incorporation of family and tradition draws almost an exact parallel to our lives outside of Fiddler on the Roof. We have ten sets of relatives that will take the stage together, sharing the love of theater as a family. To name a few, Skylar Frishman, a senior in high school, auditioned with her father Alan, who hasn't been on stage in over twenty years; Mark Taylor, who is playing Tevye for the fifth time, auditioned with his Daughter, Katie, and son, Noah; Julie Meeker and Marsha Cochran, two staples in the Waterville community, auditioned with their daughters, Carlie and Shannon respectively; We even have a newly engaged couple! Adelle Blauser and Quintin Bouillon portray Hodel and Motel the Tailor.

This cast is full of vibrance and life and it's certain that they will bring that life to the stage at the end of April. I can't wait to share this wonderful story with the Toledo area!

Waterville Elementary: Our First Home by Sam Macera

When the founders of Waterville Playshop decided to organize, the first order of business was to find a location for the productions. In the Village of Waterville, there weren't that many choices but there was only one obvious place: the Waterville Elementary School on River Road.



The current school was built in 1923 as an addition to the original 1886 building. In 1930 the 1886 section was torn down and a new addition attached to the 1923 building. Many Watervillians attended the school, including a number of Playshop members, and many wonderful memories of those times are often shared.

The school itself was not ideal for theatre. The stage was small with very little space in the wings for set storage. In addition, there were no seats. For each performance, folding chairs had to be brought in and set up and then taken down at the end of the usual two day run. But, it was a

stage and the creative members made it work, selecting shows that were always single set.

Our first production in the school was *George and Margaret* and presented there October 24, 25, 1952. In the meantime, Anthony Wayne High School was being built and the hope of the organization was that it would be completed in time for our second show, *Double* Door, scheduled for February 27 and 28, 1953 but delayed until March 6 and 7. Unfortunately, the school was not completed and our second production, *Double Door*, was also presented at Waterville Elementary School. Our third production, *Happiest Days of Your Life*, was presented in the new Anthony Wayne auditorium on June 13, 1953.

For the next 55 seasons, the AWHS auditorium was our "home."

Unfortunately, time and population growth signaled the end of the school as an educational facility when the new Waterville Primary (née Elementary) opened on January 6, 1996. Over time the old school served as a location for various businesses. Playshop presented *The Adventures of a Bear Named Paddington* there in 1992 and the theatre group at the Methodist Church, Theatre for the World, presented the hilarious *Fools*. For a time a martial arts



company was there but long-time tenants were not forthcoming and for most of the time it remained empty.

Its ultimate demise came when the need for a new bridge became a reality and a location was needed to store construction equipment.

The school is gone but those wonderful memories live on.

(Incidentally, there is an excellent article on the school in the April 2017 issue of "Bend of the River" by John Roe, an archivist at the Waterville Historic Society.)

Disney and high school are a staple of most children's lives making it a perfect paring for the theatrical stage. When entering the lobby of the Maumee Indoor Theatre the audience was transported back in time to the buzzing and vibrant halls of high school. Class pictures hung on the walls, the lines for concession were reminiscent of the school cafeteria and the crowds of people rushing around talking about who's who set the atmosphere for The Waterville Playshop's rendition of 'High School Musical.'

This story is a classic bubblegum version of boy meets girls. Pretty Brainiac Gabriella, played by Erin Ripley, meets basketball jock Troy Bolton, played by Jonathan Crawford, and they fall for each other against all social odds. Having met over the summer they find they have a mutual love for singing that bonds them tightly together and in the end their cliques together. Erin Ripley had a beautiful and sweet singing voice that lent itself to the authenticity of her character and Jonathan Crawford played the part of the basketball jock to cool and confidant perfection. The innocence of young high school love was awkward and believable. The hysterical paring of siblings Sharpay Evans, played by Eliza-beth Stuart, and Ryan Evans, played by Trevor Gill-Snow, carried the magical campy feeling of



The two story set design was amazing and built depth to an otherwise very shallow stage. Using the stage buildout around the orchestra pit and the theatre isles made for a truly interactive audience experience. The costuming was simple and cute as if it was taken right out of the hallways of any high school. The strong cast carried the peppy music through the audience despite some sporadic microphone issues from the lead characters.

What a great community performance from Waterville Playshop.


